He recalled that his first pay was 10 cents an hour for sweeping while he learned to become a doffer. He turned over all of his pay to his parents except for 50 cents each day which he kept for his own.

He was also living and working in Gibsonville at the time of his marriage but shortly thereafter persuaded his wife to move with him to his native Randolph County. He also worked in the cotton mills in Cedar Falls and the Naomi Mill in Randleman.

Besides Gibsonville, Mrs. Hinshaw lived with her parents in Central Falls, Cedar Falls, Coleridge, and Worthville. She recalls attending the Parks Cross Roads school while living in the Coleridge area, walking to school three miles each way and crossing the creek on a log.

After working in the cotton mills, Mr. and Mrs. Hinshaw raised chickens during the day and worked as a night watchman at night. He retired at the age 68. He is now 80 years of age. His wife is 77.

Jan. 21, 1985 - A Providence Township native, Hubert Clayton Gregson, now a resident at 105 Oak Lane in Randleman, reached the age of 90 on Jan. 14. Family members honored him with a birthday party on Jan. 13.

He was born Jan. 14, 1895 in the upper end of Providence Township, near the Guilford County line and on a mail route which was formerly known as Rt. 1, Pleasant Garden. His parents were Henry Clay and Hannah Elizabeth Hockett Gregson.

His career has been varied, starting off cutting cordwood for 40 cents a cord at a very young age, some say at the age of 4.

He joined the Navy, June 10, 1911 before reaching the official enlistment age and served for four years. A brother, Claude, also joined at the same time.

He served on the U. S. S. Helena and also the U. S. S. Cincinnati, recalling that he was on the U. S. S. Helena July 4, 1912 in Shanghai, China and also on the same ship at the same place at Christmas time in 1912 and 1913.

At Christmas time in 1914 he was serving on the U. S. S. Cincinnati in Manilla, Phillipine Islands. He remembers also visiting the Ming Tombs while in China.

He was discharged from the U. S. Navy in San Francisco, Calif. In 1915 and before returning home he attended the World's Fair which was being held in the same city.

While serving in the Navy he saved his money, sending it home for safekeeping with his mother. However, after returning home he retrieved it from her and purchased a Model T. Ford, supposedly the first car to be purchased in Randolph County.

His marriage to the former Hazel Ruth Barker occurred June 10.1917.

They became the parents of 12 children, two of whom, Clyde and Betty Joe, are deceased. Living children are George Gregson and Marie Shoe of Pleasant Garden; Boyd Gregson, Asheboro; Ruth Walla and Charles Lee Gregson, Randleman; James Gregson, Ferrum,Va.; Ola Mae Brown, Raleigh; Clayton Gregson, Knoxville, Tenn; Sara Fields, Westville Grove, N. J. and Helen Gregson, who is with Peace Corps in Liberia, Africa.

After returning home from the Navy he operated a sawmill in Randolph and Alamance counties for 24 years, he made molasses for 17 years, worked as a brick mason for 30 years and was employed at Camp LeJeune Marine Base during World War II.

Once while working on a school house in Cameron he fell off the scaffold and broke his neck. However. He drove all the way home, back to Rt. 1, Pleasant Garden, before he received medical attention.

His wife, Hazel, died Sept. 21, 1965 and a little over a year later he married her sister, Elsie Barker, who is now a patient at Mount Vista Health Park in Denton. The couple had moved to Randleman in 1967.

In the'50s and '60s he liked to go to Florida in the winter months to play shuffleboard. He and his late brother, Barney, of Liberty, once won the Fort Myers City Tournament in Shuffleboard.

He is a lifelong member of Providence Friends Meeting and he donated all of his work while helping to build the meeting house parsonage.

New Youth Ministry Begins

Jan. 24, 1985 - Son Power Express is the newly formed ministry to youth of Neighbors Grove Wesleyan Church., according to Rev. William C."Bill" McConnell, youth pastor and director of L. I. F. E. (Life is for Everyone) and Son Power Express.

He said "we began this fall with an average monthly attendance of 16. Five moths later our average is around 45 and growing steadily by 20 and 25 percent."

"Two factors contribute heavily to our growth." He said."One is the interest generated this fall in going to an area-wide Youth Convention in Knoxville, Tenn. Twenty-

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Seven teens and 13 adults attended with our group, which was the fourth largest single church attendance in 10

"However, preparation and the beginning of L. I. F. E. on Jan. 9 has been our biggest boost. It is a weekly meeting geared to helping meet spiritual and social needs of junior and senior high teenagers in our area. It's exciting, different and very much needed in our community to reach out to teens and tell them about Jesus Christ, But, There's more to it than that."

"The beginning group was split into three teams, adult L. I. F. E. Guards and student L. I. F. E. Captains lead each team weekly in gathering points through competition, team attendance, visitors and more. The object of this point system takes place in June when the winning team is taken on a three day retreat to Myrtle Beach. Non-winning teens may also attend provided they pay the full cost. Winners go for little or no cost whatsoever."

"Our goal for Son Power Express is not just high numbers. Numerically, our teen executive sets a goal of 109 teens on a weekly meeting night, which by the way is every Wednesday at 6:50p. m. at Neighbors Grove Wesleyan Church, 1928 N. Fayetteville St. or handing out super trip prizes. Our goal is to give teens in Asheboro something exciting to be a part of. We want to see them grow closer to God, and we want them involved in a group that plans to make a positive contribution to life in Asheboro. The strength of any community is in the quality of its people, and we plant to add to this community's already great strength by offering to the teenagers the opportunity to become involved in a group that is concerned about the quality of a person's life. Our teens are our future and that's why we want to have something to offer them-something that's exciting, fun and challenging.

"The success of the L. I. F. E. concept will not be winning trips or just having fun. Much credit will go to around 12 dedicated adults who have sacrificed a lot of time in personally training to be L. I. F. E. Guards and in keeping the weekly meetings and extra-curricular activities running smoothly. Why do the put so much time into this group? Simply because they have a burden and love for he young people who are all around them. They care about the quality of the teenagers in this city and they want to do something about it. When you have dedication to any project like they have to L. I. F. E. and to teenagers, then success is inevitable."

McConnell has been youth pastor and director of L. I. F. E. at Neighbors Grove since Aug. 1. He is a native of Ontario, Canada an a 1980 graduate of Bethany Bible College, Sussex, New Brunswick, Canada.

Dr. Fred Graham Honored

Feb. 5, 1985-Dr. Fred W. Graham Jr. an Asheboro family physician, was presented the Good Shepherd Award during the worship service at First Baptist Church Sunday, Jan. 27.

The award is sponsored by the Southern Baptist Convention and presented through the channels of the Boy Scout organization on the national level.

The award consists of a cross and staff pendant on a red. white, and blue ribbon and is presented to adult Scout leaders who have exemplified outstanding Christian character and example before the young people of America, especially those in the Boy Scouts of America organization.

Baptist Church Wipes Faith Out Indebtedness

Feb. 6, 1985 - A note-burning service at Faith Baptist Church, Rt. 1, Ramseur, Sunday, Jan. 27, wiped out an indebtedness amounting to \$200,000.

The indebtedness, covering 15 years, financed the buildings of the Faith Christian School organized by the church in 1968.

After the original trustees of the church, Ted Burgess, C. E. Moser and Raymond Cox had burned the note and the final embers had been consumed to ashes, the congregation arose to their feet and sung triumphantly "To God Be The Glory."

Also participating in the note-burning service were the Rev. Gary Moger, pastor of Faith Baptist Church, and Rev. Richard Gray, pastor at the time of the church's beginning in 1965.

Rev. Gray recalled the difficulties in raising the money to erect the buildings needed for the school which held classes in the church for the first year of its existence.

He was turned down by every financial institution in Randolph County and some elsewhere, he said. Rev. Grav. added,"you could not look up and see the bottom."

But dedication prevailed and the church raised the money needed, first \$150,000 and then an additional \$50,000 by the sale of bonds.

Greater dedication and persistence was manifested by members of the church congregation who withdrew their savings and invested in the bonds being sold by the church, officials said.

Rev. Gray rejoiced that "nobody lost a dime" by investing in the bond program.

But another contribution just as great as the purchase of the bonds was the free labor furnished by members of the congregation.

Regularly and consistently the men worked at the building site after their day's work elsewhere. Often they came to

the school site from their places of employment without going home.

It is estimated that the present school facilities could not be replaced for less than \$1.2 million.

Enrollment the first school year was 80 students for kindergarten through the 6th grade. The next year after occupying the new facilities the enrollment was 180 students, kindergarten through the ninth grade. The first graduating class was in 1973 with five graduates.

This year's enrollment is 205 students with 17 senior class.

Seven school buses transport students from seven counties, Randolph, Davidson, Guilford, Chatham, Moore, Montgomery and Alamance, including routes from Denton to Pittsboro, Robbins to Climax.

In charge of the bus routes and serving as maintenance supervisor for Faith Christian School is Steve Moser who has worked full time since Aug., 1969. Prior to that time he worked on a volunteer basis.

Moser also serves as chairman of deacons for the church. Explaining the relationship between church and school, he said, "Faith Christian School is a ministry of Faith Baptist Church."

Principal of the school is Bill Hohneisen who came the second year of the school's existence in time to help complete the erection of the school's facilities. He started the athletic program at the school and became its principal during the school year of 1981-82.

Seventeen teachers and six staff members comprise the roster at Faith Christian School.

Pastor Moger came in 1977 on a church internship program from Bob Jones University in Greenville, S. C. returned in 1979 to teach history and Bible, working also with teens. He became associate pastor in 1982 and the next year assumed the pastorate of the church. However, he still teaches computer science.

Explaining the school's purpose, Moger said,"we are not trying to compete with public schools. We just want to provide and education with a Christian philosophy according to the Bible. We are sincere in our desire to see our young people raised for Christ."

The alleviation of the indebtedness on the school has focused consideration of another project, the erection of apartments for faculty members.

A carry-in luncheon in the school building preceded the note-burning service.

Talmage Neece, a native of Providence Township and son of the late William Rufus and Emma Carolina Foust Neece, is now residing at the Will-O-Haven Nursing Home in Greensboro.

Before moving to the nursing facility he had spent his life in the area where he was born except for the time he was associated with Armour Fertillzer Co. and lived in Greensboro area. While in this county he farmed.

He was married to the former Moleta Macon, sister of Edith Macon Bowman, who died around ten years ago.

They were the parents of seven children, two of whom are deceased. Virginia Hewitt and Elizabeth Hylton.

A burial ground preceded the beginning of the Meeting at its present site, some burials having, occurred there about 40 years before the building of the Meetinghouse.

The death and burial of Mattie Olive Vuncannon on Jan. 6, 1885 prompted her son, Calhoun Vuncannon, to regret the burial of his mother in the wooded area. The very next day after the burial he started a petition for the erection for a church building at the site.

The petition was greeted with enthusiasm and a moth later Eli Branson gave 13 acres of land on which the Meetinghouse was built. Lumber for the building was sawed on the Lenzo Cox farm by the first steam sawmill in Randolph County. The framing was cut and sawed on the W. R. Ashworth place by the water mill.

At the time of completion, W. R. Ashworth and Calhoun Vuncannon said "they hoped it would do well," a statement from which the name "Hopewell Friends Meeting," was derived. The Mother Church for Hopewell was Back Creek Monthly Meeting.

The Hopewell Meeting continued under the guidance of Back Creek Monthly Meeting until their own Monthly Meeting was established in 1916.

Charter members for Hopewell Monthly Meeting were Roscoe Branson, Will Newsom, Lydia J. Luck, Levi Branson, Sallie Branson, Benn Vuncannon, Mintie Parks, Lee Briles, Walter Cox, Russell Ashworth, Manly Ashworth, Mittie Ashworth, Cora Ashworth, Rona Ashworth, Crissie Allred, Henry Allred, Ethel Allred and Esther Hussey.

Also Belle Hussey, George Hussey, Minnie Briles, Zona Lewallen, Monroe W. Lewallen, Nellie Hussey, Edward Cooper, Nellie Cooper, Pearl Cooper, Benjamin H. Dawson, Lillie Belle Gray, John Grier Gray, Marriah E. Cox, Annie Cox, Ida Cox, Esther Cox, Theodore Cox and Mary Jones.

The second church structure at Hopewell was completed Nov. 11, 1950. This building, valued at more than \$20,000, was erected at a cost of \$9,460. Charles Johnson. a

Friends Minister and pastor at Hopewell from 1949-51, drew up the plans and did most of the work himself. The original structure was sold to Callicutt's Memorial Church for \$400.

In Nov., 1967, a parsonage, the first in the history of the Meeting, was completed. Erected at a cost of \$13,727. 22, it was debt free at the time of its completion.

In Nov., 1976, a fellowship building, also the first in the history of the Meeting, was completed at the estimated cost of \$25,000. Both of these most recent structures were erected with much of the materials and labor being donated.

Cedar Falls Methodist Break Ground For New Fellowship Hall

May 28, 1985 - Cedar Falls United Methodist Church held ground breaking ceremonies recently for a fellowship hall which will connect to the north side of the existing sanctuary.

Except for limited facilities in the church basement this will be the first fellowship hall in the history of Methodism in Cedar Falls dating back to the late 1800s.

The present United Methodist Church in Cedar Falls represents a merger of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, affectionately known as the "brickyard church," and the Methodist Protestant Church, both of which were organized in the late 1800s.

The ground breaking occurred following the morning worship service conducted by the church pastor the Rev. Kay Gottula. Participating were Jack Workman, co-chairman of the building committee; Titus Nance, church lay leader; Jack Trogdon, in charge of construction; Tony York, chairperson of the administrative council; Steven Brower, president of United Methodist Men; Eva Ferree, president of United Methodist Women; and the pastor, who is also co-chairperson of the building committee.

Other members of the building committee, in addition to the above named co-chairpersons are Carrie Carter, Arnold Pugh, Eva Ferree, Jewel Hancock, Joe Hancock, Karen and Tony York, Steven Brower, R. J. Doss, Jack Trogdon, Juanita Trogdon, Ralph Duggins, Herman Trogdon, and Betty Wallace.

On Sunday, Nov. 12, 1939, the Methodist Episcopal Church, South and the Methodist Protestant Church in Cedar Falls voted for the merger of the two churches following the unification of the two denominations on the national level on May 10, 1939, in Kansas City, Missouri.

For a while after the merger in Cedar Falls, until a new church could be erected, the newly merged congregations alternated in their worship between the two buildings which had been used prior to the unification.

Since the occupancy of the United Methodist Church building in 1941, a parsonage has been erected next door to the church; a recreational fellowship room was completed beneath the sanctuary; additional classrooms constructed and major renovations to the sanctuary and parsonage have been completed.

The Cedar Falls Methodist Church has a membership of 160 and is on a circuit with the Central Falls United Methodist Church, both being served by Rev. Gottula.

The church received its name from Enoch Harshaw and his wife, Malinda, who donated the land on which both the original and present structures are located. While the new building was being erected on the same spot, the congregation worshipped in another building in the same community.

The first pastor of the church was Saul Welborn according to one source or Anthony Welborn according to another source.

Other pastors in succession were Smith Petiford, Moses Craig, Walter Price, Rev. Brown, H. M. Ellis, A. C. Miller, Rev. Blankenship, J. M. Kennedy, L. F. Wallington, W. E. Kearns, Joseph Evans, and the present pastor, W. D. Roseman.

Rev. Evans, who remained at the church for 19 years, and Rev. Kearns participated in the centennial celebration with Rev. Evans delivering the morning message and Rev. Kearns the afternoon message.

Theola Harshaw Chestnutt, president of the missionary circle, is a granddaughter of Enoch Harshaw and his wife Malinda.

Mrs. Allen, daughter of the late Frank and Margaret Dunn Comer, is a native of Moore County, having been born at Carter's Mill, but also lived in Montgomery and Randolph Counties before her marriage to Charlie Allen Aug. 21, 1918.

She has a brother, Coy L. Comer, who will be 93 year old July 14, and two sisters living, Etta Brewer, and Fannie Cagle. Deceased are two brothers, Dossie an Huey Comer, and one sister, Lillie Brower.

She recalls attending Auman's Hill School near the Randolph County line, Shady Grove School near Ether, and

Needham's Grove School in Moore County, near the Randolph County residence in which her family lived at the time of her marriage.

She and her husband lived for a while after their marriage in Hopewell, Va., where he worked during the World War I. Upon moving back they lived continuously in Moore County. Their marriage had followed a long acquaintance and courtship.

Another lady talked about the time her six-year-old son was injured by an automobile and later died from the injuries. Even though Rev. Ricks' father had also died about the same time, he immediately came to comfort her family and rode with the boy in the ambulance to a Greensboro hospital.

Still another member said,"We would call him and he was always here. We are trying to accept it. We are heartsick over it."

Henleys gather for reunion

July 31, 1985 – Descendants of Jesse Henley, who in 1793 sold the land on which the Randolph County Courthouse now stands, gathered for a reunion July 21 in the fellowship building at Charlotte United Methodist Church, four miles west of Asheboro.

Henley's Lot No. 7, as it was described, was sold for eight pounds. His signature on the deed was witnessed by John Henley, Jr., his brother, and Obadia Williams.

But that wasn't all of Jesse Henley's land. When he died in 1801 he still had hundreds of acres of land, even thousands of acres, which were distributed to relatives through his will.

Henley's grandfather, Patrick Henley, came to the eastern coast of North Carolina in 1682 from England. Patrick was a mariner, sailing from Elizabeth City to Pennsylvania. He and his wife, Sarah Culpepper, lived in the Pasquotank area. As far as the records indicate, neither Patrick nor Sarah, nor any of their children, Mary, Miriam, Elizabeth, John and his wife, Isabel Newby, ever came to Randolph County.

But Patrick's grandsons, Jesse and John Jr. did, a few years after the mid-seventies. At that time, part of Randolph County was known as Rowan County, according to a deed between Jesse Henley and Gibean Jones in 1768.

Members of the Henley Family Reunion organization believe they are descendants of Jesse Henley. He married Anne Pretlow and their children were Stephen, Isabel, John, Jesse Jr., Millicent and Agatha.

The lineage continued locally through Stephen and his wife, Anna Pearson. Their children were Stephen Jr., Abraham, Rebecca, Nathan, David Vestal and Henry.

Stephen Jr. married Virginia (Jane) Burkhead; their children were Alexander, Martha, Delphine and Erasmus Edward.

Erasmus and wife, Martha Ann Walker, were the parents of Franklin, Mamie and Marvin (twins), Robert, John, Milton, Claude, Samuel Erasmus and Lillie. This family lived in the

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vicinity of the Charlotte United Methodist Church and are the ancestors of many of the Henley families in this area.

The four children of Benjamin by his first wife, Jane Patterson, were Aug. a, Valmour, Josiah and Frances.

Benjamin Franklin Cheek died in his seventies. His second wife soon followed him in death, leaving their underage children, Roosevelt, Grant and McKinley, in care of their half-sister, Frances Bumpass and her husband, Sam, who lived near Liberty.

The children remained in the Bumpass home until they reached their majority, when the estate of their father, Benjamin, was divided among them.

Although Benjamin Franklin Cheek was born as a slave June 22, 1838 at Cheek's Mill between Coleridge and Bennett, he later acquired much land, estimated at 215 acres, and was reported to own more land than any other black man in Randolph County.

His vast holdings were situated in the Ramseur area located in the vicinity of the Ramseur Plant of Burlington Industries, Inc. and extending to Highway 49 towards Liberty. He donated land there for the building of the Friendship A. M. E. church, said to be the first black church to be erected in the Ramseur area.

Grant Cheek and his wife, Leona Waddell, live at the old homestead adjacent to the Ramseur Plant of Burlington Industries, Inc., which he inherited from his father who lived there before him. They are the parents of nine children, some of whom live in the vicinity of their parent's home and the others elsewhere.

Roosevelt Cheek, Grant's older brother, lives with his third wife on Rt. 2, Snow Camp. Roosevelt, now retired, has been a minister for 56 years. He and his first wife, Queen Bowden, were the parents of seven children.

Including Roosevelt there are four ministers in his family and two lawyers.

It was appropriate that the fourth reunion of the Benjamin Franklin Cheek family would be held at the Friendship A. M. E. Church, which was built at the suggestion and with the help of Benjamin and on the land he donated.

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Grant Cheek has been a long time member of the church while Roosevelt has donated additional land for the expansion of the cemetery.

All of Grant's nine children were present for the reunion, including three out of the state from District Heights, Md., Philadelphia, Pa. and Fremont, Calif.

Among other activities, this busy man visits Brian Center for Nursing Care on Monday and Friday of each week, mingling with the staff and offering encouragement to the patients who reside there.

Woman to celebrate 103rd birthday on Oct. 1

Sept. 29, 1985 – Corrina Alice Vuncannon Shaw is still alert at almost the age of 103; her birthday is Oct. 1. Her mind is clear and her memory unusual for one of her age; only her body is weak. She spends much of her time in bed. However, she is still able to sit in a chair.

She said she was "born with a crooked foot, but most people didn't know it." Because of this she didn't start to school until she was ten years old. Her father, Henry Vuncannon, was a school teacher and taught her at home.

"At three years of age I knew every letter in the alphabet, when I was four I knew every figure on the line, when I was five I was reading the primer," she said.

Her first school was at Long Branch, just west of Asheboro on Old 49-A. Her mother was Elizabeth Jane Bunting Vuncannon from the Rushwood Park Wesleyan Church area.

She got acquainted with her late husband, Rev. J. E. Shaw, when he carried the U. S. Mail from Asheboro to Hill's Store below Farmer. Even then he was a devout man according to Mrs. Shaw.

"He carried a Testament with him and read it while his horse cooled off in the shade," said Mrs. Shaw. He also asked permission from her father for their courtship. Concerning their marriage she said,"I would not give him a definite yes until I consulted with my father."

However, she also firmly stated that,"I am here to tell you that I never regretted marrying him, I have never seen a day that I regretted it."

Her marriage to Rev. Shaw occurred Mar. 12, 1899. He died June 23, 1967, at the age of 89. He was a minister for 60 years, 54 years of which he served as a pastor in various Pilgrim Holiness and Wesleyan Methodist Churches.

In the beginning many of the churches were small and the minister worked at public jobs in order to provide for himself, his wife and their children.

In the later years of Rev. J. E. Shaw's ministry he founded Callicutt's Mission in the edge of Montgomery County at the

graveyard where his mother was interred. Mrs. Shaw's pride for this achievement still exists. She said,"My husband had work like that dotted in many places."

Eleven children were born to Rev. and Mrs. Shaw, two of which died in infancy. A daughter, Ruth Shaw, died Sept. 12, 1938, and another daughter, Etta York, died 11 months later and still another daughter, Ora Leonard, died in recent years.

Her living children are Dora Wright, 818 Ashdol St.; Preston Shaw, Rt. 2, Franklinville; Lillie Parks, 636 S. McCrary St., with whom she resides; Harvey Shaw 1004 Lewallen St.; Martin Shaw, Worthville Road, Randleman; and James Shaw, Winston-Salem.

Her reflections at approaching 103 revolved around her eventual home-going. She said "I had just as soon the Lord would take me home." She wondered why she is the only one in a family of nine children who has lived as long as she has, but she reiterated,"I started living for the Lord when I was a little girl."

Shaw said she still delights her great-grandchildren with poems and verses which she learned during her early childhood.

Church celebrates 200th anniversary

Oct. 3, 1985 – Two hundred years ago, in the western part of rural Randolph County, near a stream named Back Creek, the Society of Friends established a Meetinghouse which was called Back Creek Friends Meeting.

Even before that time Friends arriving in the Back Creek community were known to be worshipping in their homes prior to 1780.

A special celebration on Oct. 6 is being held to recognize the 200th anniversary. Billy Britt, superintendant of the N. C. Yearly Meeting, will be the speaker. The minister at Back Creek is Randy Clendenin.

All friends and former members are invited to the worship service at 11 a. m. followed by a covered dish lunch.

The Meetinghouse is located on 26 acres of land donated by Thomas Winslow to the trustees. In 1785 it became a Preparative Meeting under the care of Cane Creek Meeting in the Western Quarter. It became a Quarterly Meeting in 1792. The first Southern Quarterly Meeting was held at Back Creek Feb. 26, 1820.

Many of the early members moved their memberships from Centre Meeting. Others came later from Symons Creek and Sutton's Creek in eastern North Carolina and from Meetings in Guilford and Alamance counties. Many came from Meetings in Pennsylvania and a few came from South Carolina.

A Meetinghouse was built by 1789. The minutes of 1797 mention the need for an addition. Friends at Back Creek, concerned about the education of their children, established in 1835 the First Day School in the area. It was discontinued during the Civil War but was re-opened after the war when a schoolhouse was built.

By that time schools had also been established in the nearby communities of Belvidere, Davis and Science Hill. Depletion of the Meeting was heavy as members moved westward to Ohio and Indiana. Crop failure, availability of better land in the west and the issue of slavery were all contributing factors to this migration.

The Civil War was an especially trying time in the life of the Meeting. Many of its young men were conscripted into service, some to the Salt Works. People left at home lost horses, cattle and provisions without any recompense. A few members were discharged for volunteering for the army. Those who suffered for refusing to perform military service were also cared for.

Meeting attendance dropped to a very low point in this period. But the faithful efforts of two members, William Lowe and Rachel Henley, who attended meetings in alternate weeks, kept the Meeting alive.

After the Civil War, visiting ministers came from Pennsylvania, Indiana, Kansas and Iowa, as well as those form N. C. Meetings. Some of them were evangelists.

Missions were an early concern of Friends and one of the members at Back Creek, Samuel A. Purdie and his wife, Gulielam Hoover Purdie, served in Mexico from 1871 through 1897. They were the first missionaries to serve under the American Friends Board of Missions.

Back Creek was instrumental in setting up three new Monthly Meetings: Science Hill in 1894, Asheboro in 1915 and Hopewell in 1916.

A new Meetinghouse was completed in 1901 for a total cost of \$500. 73. Moses Hammond from Archdale was the builder. Labor was donated and the lumber, mostly heart pine, was cut from land owned by the Meeting.

Older members recalled that just before World War I the Meetinghouse grounds would be filled with horses, buggies and wagons. Decline became noticeable after the war and it was not until the early 1950's that a renewal of interest and growth began.

The meetinghouse went for over 50 years without renovation, after which a flurry of building and remodeling took place within a 10-year-period.

Under the leadership of Geoge McDowell, minister, the Meetinghouse was completely renovated, additional classrooms added and the grounds were landscaped. A cemetery fund was established to provide perpetual care of the cemetery.

Later, in 1972, the Monthly Meeting approved the hiring of George McDowell on a full time basis. He was the first full time minister at Back Creek. Altogether he served the meeting for 27 years.

During the first years of the 20th century, the pastoral system gradually began to replace un-programmed worship. This was partially a result of the revival movement of the late 19th century and the visits of evangelists such as Albert Peele, Mary Moon and Allen Jay.

Serving as ministers, in addition to McDowell and the present minister, Clendenin, were John S. Tillman, Herbert Reynolds, Samuel Pickett, D. Virgil Pike, Allie R. Kemp, Milner A. Cox, Barney Pierce, Dallas Rush, Cleta and Ora Evans, Ed and Lola Scott, York Teague and Gerald Pike.

An important event in recent years was the establishment of the Quaker Men of the Good Neighbor Fund which is used to assist the needy in the community. During the first 10 years of its existence the fund netted \$20,000 and was used 126 times. In addition a Wednesday night prayer

meeting was initiated in 1972. The United Society of Friends Women is also active.

A history of Back Creek Meeting is being prepared by members of the Yearly Meeting Publications Board and the N. C. Friends Historical Society in cooperation with Back Creek Friends. Members of the Meeting have been helping with pictures and information.

Church celebrates 75 years

Oct. 19, 1985 – The Sophia United Church of Christ celebrated its 75th anniversary on Sept. 29. The church was formerly called Brown's Grove Community Church, Sophia Congregational Church and Sophia Congregational Christian Church.

Chairman of the 75th anniversary committee was Don Rich, assisted by committee members Audrey Rich, Sandy Rich and Troy Hall. A historical resume was given by Don Rich.

The Rev. Howard E. Ward, Sr., pastor of the church for the past 13 years, welcomed the overflowing congregation and delivered the closing remarks. Also speaking to the group was the Rev. Avery Brown, pastor of the church from 1953 to 1957. It was under his leadership that the present church structure was opened on Dec. 30, 1956.

Recognized during the service was Pearl Mendenhall, 88, believed to be the oldest member of the church. Also recognized during the service were descendants of the Rev. Samuel Penn who became pastor of the church in 1923 and severed the congregation for 14 years. Ken Hollingsworth, a missionary to Cameroon, West Africa, since 1978, was present with his wife, Judy, and children, Nathan, Anne and Carrie.

The Sophia church was first organized in 1910 in a brush arbor, located near Browns Cross Roads, on a dirt road which is now Highway 311. Before the organization of the church, meetings were held in an old school building.

During the same year a small frame building for worship was erected on land donated by J. Madison Brown, a charter member of the church. Other charter members included Douglas and Cora Harrison, Nannie Brown, Lou Rich, Mrs. Reed Jackson, A. H. Walker and A. E. Hilliard. The church was then named Brown's Grove Community Church. Ministers at this time were Rev. Lemonds, Rev. Secrest, Rev. Edward L. Wehrenburgh and Rev. Fred P. Ensminger.

During Rev. Ensminger's ministry in the "prosperous times of the roaring '20s," a two-story frame church was built in Sophia in 1922 and the name was changed to Sophia Congregational Church. This building, located on the east side of Highway 311 towards High Point, still stands.

Historians at the celebration noted, "Several members today have vivid memoirs of the old church, the ringing of the bell, the huddling toward the center of the church near the potbellied stove on a cold morning, but the most enduring memories are those centered around the love and fellowship of sharing the word of God together and working together in His service."

A full-basement fellowship hall with kitchen, closet and fireplace, proposed by Roy Hayes as far back as 1962, was completed in 1975 as well as other additions to the church-five classrooms, an office, lobby, attic, a new furnace and air conditioning unit.

Antioch celebrates centennial

Oct. 20, 1985 – Antioch Christian Church of Rt. 1, Seagrove, celebrated its 100th anniversary Oct. 6, one day early.

The Rev. Ervin Nance, pastor of the church for the past 10 years, delivered his anniversary message to a congregation which nearly filled the sanctuary. The Rev. Earlie Tucker, who preceded Rev. Nance, was present for the celebration. His predecessor, Rev. Robert Hunsucker, mailed his best wishes to the congregation.

First church meetings were held under a brush arbor. On June 19, 1886 land was selected as a building site, donated by John M. Fesmire. In Sept. of the same year the building committee reported that the church would be 24 feet wide, 40 feet long and 14 feet high. In later years more land was granted by John H. Fox.

The first church building, a wooden structure situated near the present sanctuary, was torn down and replaced by a brick building, which was erected in 1951. Thirteen members pledged to give 1,000 bricks each.

At a special meeting in 1976 the congregation decided to build a new sanctuary instead of remodeling the old one: the cost was \$129,160. The first meeting in the new sanctuary was held on the fourth Sunday in May, 1977.

Later a P. A. system was installed, the grounds were landscaped, the parking lot was paved and a parsonage was built on three acres of land.

At the celebration, Hilda Welborn presented the church's history, recorded in booklet form. Callie Needham researched the church minutes for this history while Welborn traced family ties back to the organizers of the church.

Organizers of the church were: Lewis Brady, Nancy A. Brady, Maggie A. Needham, A. L. Needham, D. B. Staley, Catherine J. Craven, H. T. Wilson, S. F. Wilson, Mary Brady, T. M. Brady, Rebecca Moffitt, W. A. C. Brady, W. M. Yow, Lydia Craven, John T. Hayes, M. A. Hayes, Margaret Needham and Rev. W. N. Hayes.

One comment in the historic booklet describes accurately the financial attitude of the church and its members."There were times in the church history where expenses were paid and the money either collected or promised. But at no time was there a mention of borrowing money to pay a debt. God always provided."

A notable record of service came from the late Walter Cox and his wife, Rosa. Cox served as choir leader for 30 years while Rosa was the church pianist for 50 years and a Sunday School teacher for 40 years.

Clifford Hayes has served as a Sunday School teacher for 32 years. Edsel Needham has served as the church secretary for 24 years. Vertle Ritter's record includes two years as assistant secretary and treasurer of the Sunday School and 21 years as its secretary and treasurer. May Lou Hayes has been assistant pianist for two years and the organist for the past 18 years. Dora Kiser, 79, a member for 66 years, is believed to have been a member longer than anyone else. Her husband, Robie Kiser, 86, was the oldest person at the anniversary observance.

Music for the event was provided by former musical groups at the church. Included were the Gospel Singers, Vera Asbill, Mary Caviness, Lucy Needham; the Country Church Quartet; Bill and Hilda Welborn, Mary Lou Hayes, Ether Asbill, C. M. Hayes, Leroy Hayes and Tim Moon.

Present deacons of the church are Clifford Hayes, Jesse Ritter, Bill Welborn, Cecil Deaton, John D. Kiser, Gary Caviness and Alton Stout.

The Rev. Winfred Bray, pastor from 1952-1954, was represented by his wife. The family members of two deceased pastors, the Rev. James A. Webster, 1890-1892 and 1903-1907, and the Rev. D. Rufus Moffitt, 1925-1936, were also present.

The Rev. William G. Brady was the first pastor when the church was organized Oct. 7, 1885. However, his ministry was cut short by his death in Feb., 1886. Other pastors include W. W. Their request to have a committee formed to study the situation was granted on May 19; the Meeting was established on Oct. 31, 1921.

This year's homecoming and ground breaking occurred within four days of 164 years after the Meeting was established.

Minister Smallwood is in his second tenure of service at Bethel, spanning an overall period of ten years. His message that Sunday was "The Time Is Here," a review of 12 years of planning since the clearing of the indebtedness from erecting the first parsonage.

A sizeable amount of money has been raised for building the new Meetinghouse, including the special offering Sunday of \$4,683. 55. Volunteer labor will be used in the construction of the new building.

Music was provided by two Randleman graduates, Hilma Dean Swaim, pianist, and Dottie G. Gaylon Cross, soloist, who is now choir director at First Baptist Church in Randleman.

Speaker after speaker, beginning with JoAnn Dean Earwood, extolled the virtues of Hamilton who, they said, endowed them with qualities which remained even to their mature years.

"We come together in joy for his life," said Earwood. She then read the poem which the students learned in the 7th grade,"lives of great men all remind us, we can make our lives sublime and departing leave behind us footprints in the sands of time."

Many spoke of the helpfulness which characterized Hamilton, especially when students needed help to further

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their education. Three students, someone recalled, furthered their education by taking cows to college with them to help pay their expenses.

John Dean remembered the principal's reaction when he and another student left school one afternoon to see the movie "Gone With the Wind" in Asheboro.

The portrait, which will be hung in an appropriate place in the high school, was unveiled by his children, Mrs. Hilda Pickard of Randleman, Mrs. Leta Rosser of Fayetteville, and H. H. Hamilton, Jr. of Charlotte.

Both daughters are also graduates of Randleman High School, Hilda Pickard in 1937 and Leta Rosser in 1941. Rosser told the audience, "We left here 42 years ago. I have hard your names time and time again."

Hamilton, a former resident of Lillington, became the principal in the fall of 1927 and left in the spring of 1943. After leaving, he returned many times, especially to attend the class reunions.

The portrait was produced by David Wooters, photographer at Portrait House. Three years ago the Class of '42 presented a Bible to the Randleman High School Library.

The original building, a one-room structure when it was first built, has undergone several changes during its 94 years including the addition of wings on both sides and the construction of Sunday school rooms. When the building was moved, the original construction could be determined by the wooden pegs in the sills.

Church celebrates 50th year

Apr. 27, 1986 – Members at Midway Wesleyan Church, 209 Worthville Road, celebrated 50 years of worship Apr. 13. Large crowds attended Sunday school, the worship service and the picnic dinner beneath the shelter.

The present church was organized by seven people from the Randleman and Worthville communities who met at the home of the late C. C. Stevens on Monday night; Jan. 6, 1936.

Six days later two members of the official board of the North Carolina Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church met with the class and acting on instructions of the conference president declared the above class to be a Wesleyan Methodist Church and a member of the North Carolina conference.

Services were conducted in homes until a church building could be erected on land which was donated by Mr. and Mrs. John Slack. The first one-room wooden building, valued at \$800 was completed with a mortgage of \$225 so the first service in the building could be held on Easter Sunday, Apr. 12, 1936.

Despite an increase in membership it took the new church two years to pay off the debt. The present building, estimated at \$350,000 was paid off in less than nine years, six years ahead of schedule. It was occupied Oct. 20, 1963.

In recent years, before the debt was paid off, various improvements have been made, including an overhead gas furnace in the fellowship hall, air conditioning in the church, the erection of a new parsonage, and new sound system, the addition of stained glass windows, wall-to-wall carpeting in the sanctuary and various other improvements.

The personnel at the church increased nearly a year ago by the addition of Miss Darlene Teague as minister of Christian Education and Music along with the ministry of young people in the congregation. Miss Teague is a graduate of Houghton College and Asbury Seminary.

The history of Jordan Memorial began in 1886 when it was called Ramseur Methodist Episcopal Church, South, organized by the Rev. J. C. Thomas, resident pastor of Asheboro's church. The congregation met in an old log school building until a building could be built on Liberty Street. The building was a tall one-story, rectangular structure with a balcony across three sides and an open front porch.

The church moved to another site 10 years later when more space was needed. The original site could not be enlarged because of the surrounding rough terrain. The building was sold to Ramseur's Marietta Lodge No. 444 in 1896 and is still being used by that institution.

In 1897, the church moved into a new building on Main Street, their present site. Various changes, renovations and additions have been added to the church throughout the years. In 1982, the church retained an architect to draw renovations for the entire church. Phase one of the renovation has been completed at a cost of more than \$3 million. The entire cost is expected to be cleared by the end of 1986.

The church's name has also undergone considerable changes: Ramseur Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 1886-1939: Ramseur Methodist Church, 1939-1954: Jordan Memorial Methodist Church, 1954 until the church became Jordan Memorial United Methodist Church following a merger of denominations.

In earlier years of the church, ministers served from three to nine charges. The first three ministers on the Ramseur Circuit, the Rev. J. C. Thomas, the Rev. J. E. Woosley and the Rev. R. S. Abernathy, served: Ramseur, Franklinville, Concord, Rehobeth, Staley, Mt. Olivet, Mt. Zion and White's Chapel.

The concluding part of the anniversary was a carry-in lunch in the fellowship hall. The sale of Mrs. Cox's book (\$5) began at the conclusion of the celebration.

Coleridge Receives Fire Truck

July 9, 1986 - Larry McAlister, chief of the Coleridge Volunteer Fire Department and C. E. Teague, assistant chief, have announced the recent purchase of an additional brush truck for the department.

The Randolph Board of Commissioners agreed to cut the district rate after hearing Emergency Services director Neil Allen recommend the lower rate.

Allen explained the cut by noting last year was the first year the district was on a taxed rate. He said the budget for the 1985-86 fiscal year was prepared on the basis of valuation of real estate alone.

But Allen said study showed the new \$35,268 budget could be financed out of an 8 cent rate. He said fire department officials kept another cent in the rate to begin a fund to replace a pumper leaving the new rate at 9 cents.

Fire officials felt there was no need to tax the people for more their budget needs, Allen explained.

Allen also said the district had a \$16,000 reserve it could use to replace and old pumper.

McAlister and Teague said they appreciate approval of the tax, "because of the tax, we are able to upgrade our equipment and buy some new turn-out gear for the firemen."

Church Celebrates Anniversary

Sept. 29, 1986 - Oliver's Chapel A. M. E. Zion Church, Rt. 1, Staley, commemorated the 125th founding anniversary Sept. 14 at both morning and afternoon services.

The morning service featured a sermon by the church's pastor, the Rev. Kenneth M. Brooks, who titled his remarks,"Let us go back to the old time church."

Going back for his members meant remembering their ancestors who first worshipped in a brush arbor in the town of Staley, not far from their present site.

The Right Rev. John H. Miller, bishop of the Central N. C. Conference of the A. M. E. Zion Church, delivered the anniversary message during the afternoon service, which followed a noon meal in the fellowship hall.

This history of the church was also presented by Mrs. Daisy Gray who said,"The church has come from a brush arbor to a brick edifice on a paved road."

People began worshiping in the brush arbor in 1861. At that time there was no name except "brush arbor" and there

was no preacher. But the people met on Sunday to sing, pray and testify in the arbor which was located on Edwards Street in downtown Staley. It has been said,"The spirit of the Lord could be felt and you could hear the believers rejoicing before you got to the arbor."

In 1900 one of the worshipers, Oliver Siler, gave two tracts of land outside Staley, one for a cemetery and another one for a church building. The first small structure was called Oliver's Chapel A. M. E. Zion Church and named in honor of the man who gave the land. It is believed the Oliver Siler, a member of the brush arbor group was inspired by the Lord to move the church close to the homes of the black community.

The first building at Oliver's Chapel was small and a portion of it was of log construction.

A second larger building was erected in 1921 but it was still not a desirable site because it was located on a dead end dirt road which became almost impassable when it rained. However, the area was quiet with shade from big oaks.

But in 1960, when the Rev. J. C. Gray became the pastor,he had a dream that the church should come out of the corner of the woods and get out on the road where they could be seen. He raised \$7,000 before he was moved to another church and the Rev. Ocie Brown, a member of the church and a resident of the community, continued raising money to build a new church on the paved road a third of a mile from the old church site.

C. E. Brooks of Cincinnati, Ohio, donated the land on which the new church building was erected. His mother, the late Agnes Brooks, reared 10 children in the old log house located on the one-acre tract.

A victory March for the old church to the present site was held by the Rev. Mrs. Brown and members of the congregation when the first service was held. In 1977 the Rev. Annie P. Hart became pastor and the mortgage was burned

In 1980, Mrs. Hart was succeeded by the Rev. Kenneth M. Brooks who has served since that time. During his pastorate a church steeple has been erected, the yard landscaped, a fellowship hall renovated, a church bus purchased along with new church doors, signs, office furniture, lighting fixtures, improvement of heating and cooling, a new carpet and a P. A. system.

The anniversary committee consisted of Helen Headen, chairman; Vera Andrews, Ada Coble, Wanda McMaster, Sharon Brooks, Michael McMaster, Shirley Brooks, Ann Johnson, Annie Matthews, Betty Peoples, and Rev. Brooks.

Church members break ground for Family Center

Dec. 12, 1986 – First Christian Church in Ramseur had an attendance of 365 on the Sunday before Thanksgiving—the day of groundbreaking for the Family Center.

The groundbreaking was held on a newly purchased tract of land which adjoins the existing property.

Participating in the groundbreaking service were the adult and children's choirs: the Rev. Adrian Pugh, pastor; the Rev. Dwayne Pugh, assistant pastor; Jimmy York, deacon chairman, and deacons, Cecil Gardner, Doug Wright, Elvin Cox, Roy Smith, Danny Burgess, Bruce Burgess, and Bob Stout; trustees, Lynn Fields and Junior Poe. Roy Smith a deacon for more than 40 years, shoveled the first dirt.

The new building, a two-level structure of brick and metal, will be 135 feet long and 85 feet wide. Estimated cost is \$250,000-\$300,000. Already \$77,000 has been raised. Construction is planned to begin in Apr. .

"The building will meet the needs of the entire family," said Pugh, adding the center will have an Annual Program for ages 3-19, a gymnasium, an indoor tennis court, a roller skating area, shower facilities downstairs and weight lifting equipment. There will be space for senior citizen members

to use their God-given wisdom and talents to enrich younger members in various fields and crafts.

Since Pugh became pastor of First Christian Church, formerly Ramseur Christian Church, on Jan. 1, 1980, the church has steadily moved forward, from approximately 100 people to the present 265 in Sunday School and 300 in the worship service. During Pugh's first year a bus ministry was started.

In 1981 the old church sanctuary was torn down and a new church sanctuary, with balcony classrooms, fellowship hall and prophet's chamber, was completed in 1982. The weekly offering grew from approximately \$100 to \$3,000.
